Richard Jarvis, our President

When did your photography journey start?

My journey really started in 2019 when I made a conscious decision to stop taking snapshots and start trying to take photos. At the end of 2019, Deborah and I went on a white Christmas holiday in northern Europe where we both tried to outdo each other in our travel photography, and that healthy competition was great for us both (not to mention resulting in some great captures). As to which of us was better... we were tied at full time, and the jury is out who won the penalty shootout.

Do you have a favourite topic/genre to photograph?

I particularly enjoy creative photography. I especially like light painting, but in each genre, I like trying something different and I'm no longer as concerned as I once was if the judge hates it. It's no coincidence the challenge topics I've enjoyed the most have been the ones I initially felt like I was out of my depth.

What camera do you use?

I use a Sony A7IV with lots and lots of lenses + all the essential toys. Deborah and I both shooting Sony has been great as we can share lenses and I'm less embarrassed about desperately needing a new one.

The essentials in your camera bag at this moment?

Fortunately, I have a large bag which can be mistaken for a 20' container. My normal kitout is: body with 24-70, then 70-200, 20mm prime, remote trigger, ND filters, torches, plus assorted cleaning cloths, dust blowers, batteries, cables etc. Yet somehow, I always find space for something else.

The photographer you find inspiring?

That's difficult - I love Helen McLeod's imagination, and on the light painting side Jason D Page and Eric Paré are just a couple of the amazing photographers out there. I'm definitely attracted more to the ones who bring something new - I'm not that interested in photographers who simply replicate what others are doing without bringing anything new.

A personal photography project offers benefits you can't get from casual shooting, no matter your skill level or ambitions. Here's why:

1. Focused Energy and Purpose

A project channels your energy toward a single goal, helping you move beyond photographing things that just "catch your eye." This is super powerful because your creative energy gets diluted the more you apply it in many different directions. A single beam of light is more powerful than one that is diffuse and scattered.

2. Creative Constraints = Breakthroughs

By limiting your options, you force yourself to see the same subject in new ways. Creativity isn't about endless variety—it's about deep exploration. Depth over breadth is the general idea here.

3. Intrinsic Motivation

Working on something you're genuinely passionate about naturally boosts focus and drive. Working on projects has definitely helped me stay engaged with photography when the voice of resistance gets loud—usually at 4am when the alarm reminds me of my plans to go out for sunrise.

4. Accelerated Growth

There's no better way to improve than by consistently working on the same challenges—whether technical, aesthetic, or mental. Practice and repetition are key to internalizing the fundamentals so that they become second nature—the key ingredient to entering the all important "flow" state.

5. Discover Hidden Connections

Projects help you notice relationships between images, subjects, gear, or even your mindset that might otherwise go unnoticed. There's no better way to learn what your strengths *and* weaknesses are.

6. A Sense of Fulfilment

Completing a project brings a deeper sense of accomplishment than accumulating unrelated images ever could. This is especially true when you share your work with others that makes a difference in their lives.

7. Build a Cohesive Body of Work

A project is the foundation of storytelling in photography. It allows you to create a unified portfolio rather than a scattered collection of images. Storytelling is where your images go from individual "words" to sentences and paragraphs that can communicate something deep and meaningful to others.
